National Junior Recognition Program



The National Junior Recognition Program provides an opportunity for young Angus breeders to become nationally recognized for continued achievement. This program is based on activities over a Junior member's entire career. There are three levels of recognition; Bronze, Silver, and Gold. Bronze and Silver Awards can be earned at any age. The Gold Award, however, will be given only during their final year of eligibility as a junior member. Winners of the various levels receive a specially designed pin, cast in the metal of the respective award (Bronze, Silver, or Gold). Recipients of the National Junior Recognition Program Awards also receive local, regional, and national recognition through media and at Angus functions.

Code of Conduct

The American Angus Association offers the following guidelines for National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members to ensure conduct that reflects the strong, positive values and behavior established during their involvement as a junior member. NJAA junior members are expected to conduct themselves at all times in a way that benefits their surroundings, the organization and our industry.

The signed Code of Conduct must be submitted annually prior to an individual's attendance at his or her first scheduled NJAA event and will be maintained at the American Angus Association for the duration of the applicable year. Prior to each overnight activity, the Code of Conduct will be reviewed and acknowledged by the junior member.

While attending NJAA activities and events, I will:

- Obey all rules established by the NJAA Board and Advisors and all local, state and federal laws.
- Be respectful and courteous of all people at all times.
- Respect the property and the facilities being used for an event and only use the facilities, buildings or other places deemed acceptable while at the event. I will avoid places or activities that in any way could raise questions as to my safety, moral character or conduct.
- Refrain from loud, unruly talking; vulgar language; swearing; and other unbecoming conduct.
- Dress appropriately for the occasion and event, as deemed by event organizers.
- Demonstrate sportsmanship in all competitions and contests. I will be modest in winning and generous in defeat.
- Utilize teamwork to help others succeed.
- Cooperate in all programs and activities.
- Attend and be on time to meetings, events, and activities including meal functions, as it is expected and mandatory.
- Abstain from having possession, using and consuming alcohol, tobacco or drugs. I will list all prescription medication on the medical release form.
- Represent the National Junior Angus Association, the Angus breed, the beef industry and the agriculture industry with pride.

While attending NJAA overnight events, I will also:

- Be courteous to the other guests and remain quiet in the hallways.
- Follow announced curfew times. A room check will be done to account for all participants.
- I will remain in my designated room and not enter other sleeping areas after curfew.
- I will not invite non-NJAA members to enter sleeping areas at any time.

Consequences of breaking the NJAA Code of Conduct and any additional rules set forth at any NJAA-sponsored event may include, but are not limited to, being sent home immediately and at the expense of the member as well as not being allowed to participate in future NJAA-sponsored events and/or shows.

NJAA advisors have authority to determine consequences for conduct (listed and non-listed) deemed unacceptable.

By signing this agreement, I acknowledge I have read and understand the National Junior Angus Association Code of Conduct and pledge to uphold the rules at each conference and event sponsored by the NJAA. I am aware that the actions and decisions of both myself and others that violate these rules may result in the loss of privileges. In the event that these rules are broken or abused, I understand my parents and/or guardians will be notified.

General Rules

POLICY STATEMENT OF THE AMERICAN ANGUS ASSOCIATION

Set forth below are those rules that the American Angus Association has adopted for use at its National, Regional and Regional Preview Junior Angus shows.

The Association would like to use this space to publicly re-affirm its commitment and dedication to these shows of the National Junior Angus Association. Junior Angus shows are primarily held to foster the interests of the participating junior members in the Angus breed as well as to provide them with a special, hands-on opportunity to breed, raise and show Angus cattle. The intended emphasis in the junior shows has always been on competition among peers as well as the development of leadership skills, decision-making skills and a sense of responsibility.

Some of these rules are necessarily based on the honesty and integrity of the participating junior member as well as his or her parents. Many of the most basic rules of the American Angus Association are similarly based. If any participating junior member has a question or concern about what a particular rule means, he or she should write Caitlyn Brandt, Director of Events & Junior Activities, at 3201 Frederick Avenue, St. Joseph, MO 64506 or e-mail her at cbrandt@angus.org to obtain an interpretation. The Association will periodically report on significant interpretations of these rules in the Angus Journal.

RED INDICATES UPDATED RULES AS OF JANUARY 2026.

I. ELIGIBILITY OF EXHIBITORS AND ENTRIES

- 1. Exhibitors must be ages 7-21 as of January 1 of the current year with birthdates ranging from January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2018 and must be a Junior, Regular or Life Member of the American Angus Association. Junior membership shall be issued only to an individual and shall expire upon the attainment of age 21. Participation is acceptable through the calendar year of the individual's 21st birthday.
- 2. Bred and owned animals can be multi-owned provided the name and member code of the junior exhibitor is listed as "breeder" and "first and continuous owner" on the registration certificate. "Breeder" is defined as the recorded owner of the dam at the time of service. "First Owner" is defined as the recorded owner of the dam at the time the calf is born. "Continuous Owner" is defined as the recorded owner of the animal without history of transfer.
- 3. Owned animals can be multi-owned between siblings as long as all siblings own the animal by the ownership date and are within NJAA show rule ages (as of January 1).
- 4. Farm or ranch names are not allowed, even if the junior is the sole proprietor of the farm or ranch. Joint ownerships with farm or ranch names are only allowed on bred-and-owned entries, provided the exhibitor is listed as "breeder" and "first and continuous owner" on the registration certificate.
- 5. Applications for registration and transfer of ownership must be recorded in the name(s) of the exhibitor(s) by the ownership deadline indicated for each show. Ownership refers to the process date NOT the sale date. No late transfers will be accepted.

NOTE: If you do not have registration papers in your hands 2 weeks prior to the transfer deadline, please contact the registration department before the transfer deadline date.

6. Entries will be submitted ONLINE ONLY with accompanying entry fees at the time of entry. No substitutions will be accepted or refunds given after the entry deadlines.

You must have a registration number before completing your online entry form. "PENDING" or "APPLIED FOR" will not, under any circumstances, be accepted online in the registration column on the entry form.

- 7. An ownership correction after an animal has been exhibited at an American Angus Association sponsored show will result in the ineligibility of showing in any association sponsored junior show for one year, after the date of ownership correction. Ownership correction does not refer to transfer.
- 8. Corrections to an animal's registration regarding ownership or birthdate after entry deadline of NJAA sponsored show will be subject to disqualification from the entered show.

II. FITTING AND SHOWING GUIDELINES

- 1. Each entry must be shown by its owner. If an owner cannot show his/her own animal due to medical reasons, written permission must be obtained from the Director of Events & Junior Activities for another junior Angus association member to show the animal. The junior member owner must be present at time of show. In the administration of this rule a note of explanation is required from a licensed medical professional to obtain written permission from the Director of Events & Junior Activities.
- 2. If a junior member can't show his /her own animal due to multiple entries in his/her respective class or division, another junior Angus association member is allowed to show the additional entry.
- 3. Only one person will be allowed to lead each entry in the showring.
- 4. Any exhibitor who loses control of his/her entry more than twice in the showring will be asked to remove the animal from the ring.
- 5. All entries must be on time for their respective class. Once the entries in the exhibitor's respective class have begun walking into the profile view, the exhibitor is too late and ineligible to compete.
- 6. Bulls 12 months of age or older must be shown with a nose lead.
- 7. All entries are subject to Rule 800: Show Rules of the American Angus Association as listed in the Breeders Reference Guide. Rule 800 includes identification of animals; confirmation and structure; alteration of conformation and structure; exhibitor conduct as well as other rules pertaining to the exhibition of Angus cattle. The 800 Show Rules supersede the Show Rules published by an Association-approved livestock show, to the extent that there is a conflict.
- 8. Under the Association rules each animal for which entry application (registration) is received, may be subjected to DNA marker typing to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under Association rules. Staff of the American Angus Association must supervise the collection of DNA samples.

If a recorded parent is excluded (as a parent) as a result of DNA, the owner may request, at his own expense, the Association to determine the actual parent. Failure to determine the sire and dam disqualifies the animal's eligibility in the Angus Herd Book, and the registration certificate becomes null and void.

9. Each exhibitor is responsible for having his/her animal(s) presented in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification, except for the grooming of hair and hooves. The exhibition of cattle displaying false hair will not be allowed. Painting of white skin and surgical alteration of an animal's conformation or appearance is prohibited.

Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.

All entries are subject to visual inspection and/or laboratory testing. The exhibitor of any entry found to be in violation of the above rules will forfeit all awards and premiums and may be disqualified from exhibiting at future Association-sponsored shows.

- 10. Any animal, which does not have legible primary identification marks (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks, hot branded marks, or electronic identification tag (EID)) corresponding to the primary identification on its registration certificate, upon checking in for the show is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect, illegible, or absence of a primary identification mark, animals cannot be identified and re-checked at the show.
- 11. Junior Angus exhibitors are required to wear tucked-in, collared shirts while in the show ring at all regional preview, regional and National Junior Angus Show. Some shows do have a required dress code that must be worn in order to show. At all other shows, exhibitors should dress appropriately. Dark pants, a white or light-colored shirt, and boots are suggested. T-shirts, shorts, athletic shoes, etc. are discouraged.
- 12. The use of products in aerosol cans in preparing an animal for showing will not be permitted once the animal enters the line-up area for the show. The use of these products in the line-up area will result in the animal being dismissed and not being allowed to show.
- 13. At any show, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners shall be allowed to use any color agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test.
- 14. The use of chin straps to alter the confirmation or appearance of an animal is not allowed in the show ring.
- 15. International participants must hold a National Junior Angus Association membership and have cattle registered with the American Angus Association.

III. MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. (REGIONAL AND NATL ONLY) No farm signs will be allowed at shows where exhibitors are stalled by state.
- 2. (REGIONAL AND NATL ONLY) Cattle must be stalled with the state in which their herd is located.
- 3. (NATL ONLY) No animal shown may be transferred or have a paper corrected after the show with a sale date prior to the show. Such a transfer or correction will cause the animal to be ineligible for competition for any (junior or open) association-sponsored show for one year.
- 4. No nursing cows are allowed on the fairgrounds except those properly entered in accordance with the rules governing the cow-calf classes.
- 5. All animals must meet the health requirements for exhibition purposes as required by the state department of animal health for the show being entered.
- 6. Exhibitors providing pamphlets, samples, instructions, etc., shall remain within their own booth. No roving vendor or solicitor, acting from a profit, non-profit, religious, or other organization, or on its behalf, shall be permitted on the fairgrounds.
- 7. Dogs are strongly discouraged and will not be allowed in the make-up or show ring areas.

IV. AGREEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY AND LIABILITY

- 1. It is clearly understood and agreed that the American Angus Association, its affiliates and their officials, officers, directors, employees and agents (hereinafter collectively referred to as "the Association") shall not be responsible for any damage, illness, loss or injury to any person or property arising out of or relating to any party's participation in any national, regional and regional preview junior Angus show ("Event"), whether caused by the negligence or other conduct of the Association or any third party. The exhibitor, owner, their agents, representatives, parents and/or guardians (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Participants"), agree to indemnify and hold the Association harmless from and against any and all damage, injury, illness or loss suffered during or in connection with any Event. In the event the Association is subject to any expense or liability, including, but not limited to consultant fees, legal or court costs, Association management labor and expenses, expenses and/or costs for blood, tissue, urine, hide and/or carcass sampling and testing incurred as a result of the Association's rules and regulations violations and all agreements thereunder, including, but not limited to unethical fitting, filling, meat tampering, illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance(s) as a result of participants involvement in the Event, Participants shall indemnify and hold harmless the Association from and against all damage, expenses or liabilities incurred as a result thereof. Participant may also be subject to criminal charges.
- 2. Participants understand the inherent risk and danger of the Event and the potential for injury and illness that exists when participating in any Event. Participants assume all risk of and responsibility for any injury, illness, death, property damage, or property loss that they may suffer in connection with participation in any Event whether caused by the negligence or other conduct of the Association, third parties, or otherwise. The Association shall not be liable for any consequences of Association's medical treatment of any Participant or Association's decision(s) relating to medical treatment for any Participant.
- 3. The Participant will have full control, custody, care and feeding of any animal(s) and/or personal property, which are brought on or about the premises of the site of the national, regional, and regional preview junior Angus shows. It is clearly understood and agreed between the parties that, as a material condition to any Participant entering or showing at the national, regional, and regional preview junior Angus shows, Association will at no time have control, custody, or care of any animal(s) and/or personal property, which are brought on or about the national, regional, and regional preview junior Angus show site.
- 4. For the overall working of the show, the Participant will maintain control, custody, care and feeding for any and all animals and/or personal property in accordance with rules and regulations of the national, regional and regional preview junior Angus shows, and in no way will the Association be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur or be caused by any animal or personal property.
- 5. By submitting an application for entry, Participants agree to be bound by and comply with these General Rules and all the rules and regulations governing the Event as published in the rules and governed under the American Angus Association rules. Further, these provisions include total ownership of the entry for the prescribed number of days, continuous possession and care and provisions against unethical fitting, filling, and/or alteration of conformation and color of animals(s), meat tampering and illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance.

REMEMBER, bring your registration certificates and be certain that all permanent identification marks are correct and legible. If they are incorrect, illegible, or absent, the animal will not be allowed to show! If you have any problems concerning permanent identification marks contact the American Angus Association, telephone (816) 383-5100 PRIOR to leaving home.



800 Show Rules

from the Breeder's Reference Guide

Rule 800: Show Rules

The Association regularly appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums at certain Fairs, Shows and Exhibitions. These funds are appropriated for the purpose of rewarding member exhibitors or member owners of those animals whose conformation is most desirable and properly attained. In the case of breeding stock, it is for the additional purpose of recognizing conformation most likely to add value to breed improvement. In order to carry out these purposes, the Association has established these Show Rules. Simply stated, these rules have been drafted to ensure that all animals presented for exhibition at Association-approved livestock shows shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any Prohibited substance or by any involvement in Unethical Fitting.

Rule 801: Ownership of Animals Presented for Exhibition

- a. Each registered animal entered for competition at any Association-approved livestock show must:
 - be exhibited in the name of the member owner of record of the animal at the time it is presented for exhibition; and in the event that there is more than one owner of record, in the name of at least one of such owners of record, who is a member of the Association; and,
 - be exhibited in compliance with the Rules or Regulations governing the ownership of animals at the Fair, Livestock Show or Exposition at which the animal was exhibited.
- b. The exhibition of any animal, the legal title to which has passed by public or private sale subject to a reservation of the privileges of exhibiting such animal subsequent to its sale and prior to its transfer on the records of the Association, shall not be deemed a violation of the provisions of paragraph (a) (1), of this Rule.

Rule 802: Age Classification of Animals Presented for Exhibition

Each member exhibitor or member owner is responsible for having each animal entered in the proper class or classes in which it belongs according to the birth date of such animal.

Rule 803: Identification of Animals Presented for Exhibition

- a. Each member exhibitor or member owner is responsible for having each animal identifiable at check-in time by legible primary identification marks corresponding to either (1) the Certificate of Registration of such animal, the original of which must be available for inspection prior to the exhibit at each show, or (2) another approved current proof of ownership issued by the American Angus Association. (As amended on September 11, 2010)
- b. If inspection of primary identification marks by an authorized representative of the Association reveals that primary identification marks are absent, illegible, or not in conformity with registration, the animal shall be barred from exhibition at the show where examined.
 - 1. In instances where a purchased animal is presented for exhibition with primary identification marks absent, DNA-marker-typing may be required before registration is validated and the new identification marks are recognized.
 - 2. In instances where a registered animal is presented for exhibition by the original member owner with primary identification marks absent, a written statement may be required to be filed with the Association office documenting proper identity and confirming the fact that re-application of primary identification marks has been accomplished.
 - 3. In instances where a registered animal is presented for exhibition with two or more sets of primary identification marks, DNA-marker-typing may be required in order to validate registration.
 - 4. In instances where a registered animal is presented for exhibition with primary identification marks not in agreement with registration, the original owner may be required to document accuracy to the Association. DNA-marker-typing may be required to validate registration.
 - 5. In instances where a registered animal is presented for exhibition with primary identification marks in agreement with registration but type (tattoo vs brand) of identification is incorrect, the owner may be allowed to show, and the original registration paper must be returned for correction.

Rule 804: Conformation and Structure of Animals Presented for Exhibition

Each member exhibitor or member owner is responsible for having each animal fitted and presented in the showring in its natural conformation and structure without improper alteration.

Rule 805: Alteration of Conformation and Structure by Use of Prohibited Substance or Unethical Fitting

- a. Each member exhibitor or member owner is prohibited from altering the conformation or the structure of an animal by injection or internal or external administration of any Prohibited Substance or by involvement in an Unethical Fitting. The member exhibitor and/or member owner is responsible for the acts of any fitter found to have altered an animal in violation of these Rules or the Rules and Regulations of any Association-approved livestock show.
- b. Exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners who participate in shows that are administered by or receive premium support from the American Angus Association shall not be allowed to use any form of coloring agent at such show on any animal exhibited. (As amended June 8, 2023)

The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.

Rule 806: Submission of Cattle for Inspection

Each member exhibitor or owner shall: (1) submit any registered Angus cattle to such tests and examinations by authorized representatives of the Association or of the relevant Association-approved livestock show as may be requested thereby; (2) release the Association, its officers, directors, employees and agents from any and all claims for damages arising in connection with the administration of any such test or examination and any and all decisions based upon or otherwise using or incorporating the results thereof; and (3) in the event such member exhibitor or member owner desires to dispute or challenge the results of any such test or examination applied to his animals, do so only in accordance with the procedures established by the Rules of the Association.

Rule 807: Enforcement of Association Rules at Association-Approved Livestock Shows

Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein, including barring a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

Rule 808: Exhibitor Conduct

Member exhibitors and member owners, as well as their representatives and employees, shall act in a sportsmanlike and professional manner in the showring. Judges and show officials shall be treated with courtesy and respect. Exhibitors shall not engage in or direct any abusive, threatening, or obscene conduct toward judges, show officials or other exhibitors.

Rule 809: Relationship Between These Rules and Show-Specific Rules

These Rules supersede the Show Rules published by an Association-approved livestock show, to the extent that there is a conflict.

Rule 810: Certain Junior Shows

The Board of Directors may, from time to time, also adopt and disseminate rules and guidelines to be used at selected junior shows at which the Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums. Such rules and guidelines may be enforced by authorized representatives of the Association.

PHENOTYPE AND GENOTYPE SHOW (PGS) SHOW RULES

The objective behind the Phenotype and Genotype Show (PGS) is to create another avenue for exhibitors to show their heifers and bulls in an additional competition while providing an educational opportunity to learn about the value of Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs) and economic selection indexes (\$Values) as a part of the process in selecting seedstock. Animals entered in the PGS will be evaluated by a judge under a system that requires both genotypes and phenotypes to be considered. The results will be a composite score where the genotype (EPDs & \$Values) placing, and phenotype placings will be equally weighted at fifty percent.

Overview:

Exhibitors can enter in the PGS online while entering for a specific show. However, to enter the PGS, all animals must be genomic tested (either Angus GS™ or HD50K for Angus) with a DNA sample on file with Angus Genetics Incorporated (AGI), by entry deadline.

GE-EPDs are required at the time of check-in. Any animal with interim EPDs or EPDs not enhanced with genomic results at time of check-in will not be allowed to show. The PGS judge will receive judge's cards split in classes that include entry number, birthdate, and EPDs/\$Values (CED, BW, WW, YW, Milk, Marb, REA, \$M, \$B, \$C) along with a percentile breakdown. For the PGS, the same judge will evaluate the EPDs/\$Values and the phenotype classes. He/she will place the class based on his/her preferences. Results will be turned into the Association staff to compile prior to the show. The show will be run similar to other NJAA/AAA sponsored shows where the judge will evaluate the class in the same manner as a regular phenotype show. The judge will receive a judge's card with birthdates only for phenotype classes. The phenotype placings will be recorded and compiled with the genotype placings. The composite score will be made up of 50% genotype placing and 50% phenotype placings. In the event of a tie, the tie will be broke based on the phenotype placings. The judge will then receive a judge's card with the composite placing and respective EPDs to talk the class. During divisions and the grand drive, the judge will receive judge's cards.

To Enter:

- 1. All animals must have been genomic tested, with a DNA sample on file with AGI, by ownership deadline. The animal must be tested with Angus GS or HD50K; Basic parentage testing does not qualify for this show.
- 2. GE-EPDs are required at the time of check-in.
- 3. Any animal with interim EPDs or EPDs not enhanced with genomic results at time of check-in will not be allowed to show.

Show Categories:

- 1. NJAA Sponsored Shows: Only females are allowed to enter with no specification on bred-and-owned versus owned. Champions will be selected in each division. Grand and Reserve Champion PGS Females will be awarded. (At NJAS a Bred and Owned PGS Female will be selected)

- 5. Classes will be made up after cattle have been checked-in at the show with no more than 15 head in any class and on a logical age break, not necessarily following formal American Angus Association classifications.

MID ATLANTIC JUNIOR ANGUS CLASSIC REGIONAL PREVIEW SPECIFIC SHOW RULES

- 1. There will be classes for cow-calf pairs, bred-and-owned bulls, bred-and-owned heifers, bred-and-owned steers, owned heifers, PGS heifers, owned steers and crossbred steers. Champions will be selected in each category. There will be no supreme overall champion.
- 2. PGS Heifers: All animals must have been genomic tested, with a DNA sample on file with AGI, by ownership deadline. The animal must be tested with Angus GS or HD50K Basic parentage testing does not qualify for this show. GE-EPDs are required at the time of check-in. Any animal with interim EPDs or EPDs not enhanced with genomic results at time of check-in will not be allowed to show.
- 3. The crossbred steer division is for black-hided, black-haired Angus influenced crossbred steers. The calf must have a solid black main body with no other color behind the shoulder, above the flanks, or breaking the midline behind the should, excluding the tail. The Show Committee will have the final decision. All steers will be weighed and classes broken according to those weights.

All steers will be judged as "feeder" cattle; there will not be any market classes.

 - Cow must be born on or before August 31, 2023.
 - B. Cow must be bred-and-owned or solely owned by the exhibitor at the time of ownership deadline.
 - C. Calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and must be born on or after June 20, 2025.
 - Calf must be registered and tattooed by show date and have original registration paper.

There will be no separate division for bred-and-owned vs. owned cow-calf pairs.

Awards:

Late entries at double the entry fee will be accepted until May 1, 2026. Late entries apply for Open and junior Show. Late Late entries will be accepted until May 15 at four times the late entry fee. \$560 per animal.
- 4. For the Junior Show Applications for registration and/or transfer of ownership including bred and owned must be done on or before May 1, 2026. Ownership rules set forth by the NJAA apply. Each junior entry must be shown by its owner. If an owner cannot show his/her own animal due to medical reasons written permission must be obtained from the American Angus Associations Events and Junior Activities Department for another Junior Angus Association member to show the animal. The original owner of the animal must be present at the show.
- 5. Junior exhibitor's date of birth must be from January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2018.

- 7. Show classifications for PGS heifers: September 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025.

Open Cow/Calf

- 1. There will be two championship divisions: one for cows with embryo calves and one for natural calves. The calf must be registered to be eligible to show. A cow can only show in one division.
- Grand Champion of each division (cow/calf, female, bulls) will be eligible to compete for Supreme Champion of the Atlantic National Super ROV Angus Show.

- 4. Premier Sire: Points based on the Atlantic National point system.
- 5. Breeder Six Head: Best six head that are owned or co-owned by one exhibitor. Must conform to American Angus Association Rules regarding this division. The exhibitor of the breeder's six head must be breeder and first owner, identified by the same member code for the animals exhibited. Cattle owned by other exhibitors may be included provided the exhibitor of the breeder's six head is the breeder and first owner of the included animals. Animals must also be exhibited in individual classes. Cattle which are bred and owned by a junior member(s) may be included if the exhibitor of the breeders six head is an individual or married couple and is the parent or legal guardian of the junior member(s).
- 6. Junior Show: State Group 5 head shown at least 3 exhibitors must be represented.

Junior Showmanship Contest

The showmanship contest will be held on Friday, May 22nd, 2026 at 10:30 a.m. These are the age divisions and will show in this order:

Senior: 17-20 years old

Intermediate: 14-17 years old Int. A 14-15 Int. B 16-17 (We will split into A and B divisions if over 50 participants)

Junior: 10-13 years old Jr. A 10-11 Jr. B 12-13

Novice 7-9 years old Peewee ages 6 and under

All divisions will be divided into classes. First place in each division will return for the selection of the Grand Champion Showman. The Peewee class winner won't compete for the selection of champion showman.

Identification Marks

Each animal must have legible permanent identification marks that correspond to the registration certificate. Any animal upon check-in which does not have any legible permanent identification marks corresponding to its registration certificate will be ineligible to show.

DNA

Under the American Angus Association rules each animal for which entry application (registration) is received may be subjected to a DNA test to verify both accuracy of parentage and blood type as coved under the current Association rules.

Fitting Rule

Effective July 1, 2004, any show where the American Angus Association appropriates funds towards payment of premiums, no exhibitors or member owners shall be allowed to use any coloring agents on any animal exhibited. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers allowed in designated makeup areas.

Dress Code

Numbers provided must be exhibited front and back before entering the show ring. Remember — plain light blue and white are the only colors. Be prepared — plan for this before the show.

Atlantic National Merit Award and Scholarships

Applicants will be required to submit a resume, brief personal essay, and letter of recommendation. Finalists will be interviewed during the Atlantic National on Friday, May 22. Must be present for award presentation prior to selection of Grand Champion Female on Sunday.



2026 NATIONAL JUNIOR ANGUS SHOW SPECIFIC SHOW RULES

GENERAL RULES OF THE AMERICAN ANGUS ASSOCIATION APPLY TO ALL SHOWS. See General Rules of the American Angus Association for the policy statement, eligibility of exhibitors and entries, fitting and showing guidelines and miscellaneous rules.

Show Categories:

- There will be classes for bred-and-owned bulls, bred-and-owned heifers, heifers owned but not bred by exhibitor, live steers, carcass steers, bred-and-owned cow-calf pairs, owned cow-calf pairs, phenotype and genotype females and phenotype and genotype bred-and-owned bulls. Champions will be selected in each category. Champions will also be selected for bred-and-owned steer and bred-and-owned carcass steer, from the owned classes. Champions will also be selected for bred-and-owned phenotype and genotype female from the owned classes. There will be no overall champion.
- 2. Entries will be listed in the program in order of age (youngest to oldest) and will be led into the showring in order of program number.
- 3. Classes will be made up after cattle have been checked-in at the show with no more than 15 head in any class and will follow the American Angus Association Classifications.

Division champions in the respective categories will be named:

- Cow-Calf Pairs: Two-year-old (cows born June 1, 2023 and after). Mature (cows born before June 1, 2023 or before)
- Bred-and-owned bulls: calf, intermediate, junior yearling
- Bred-and-owned heifers: late and early calf, intermediate, late and early junior yearlings, and senior yearling
- Owned heifers: heifer calf division 1, heifer calf division 2, heifer calf division 3, intermediate division 1, intermediate division 2, intermediate division 3, junior yearling division 1, junior yearling division 2, junior yearling division 3, junior yearling division 4, junior yearling division 5, junior yearling division 6, junior division 7, senior yearling division 1, senior yearling division 2.
- Phenotype and Genotype Show Females
- Phenotype and Genotype Bred-and-Owned Bulls

Show classifications for heifers: September 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025.

Show classifications for bulls: September 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025.

Show classifications for steers: January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

Show classifications for carcass steers: January 1, 2025 through July 1, 2025 and must have a minimum live weight of 1100 pounds.

- 4. Any bred-and-owned cow-calf pair may be exhibited provided the cow and calf are both bred-and-owned by the junior exhibitor and the following rules are met:
 - A. Cow must be bred-and-owned by the exhibitor.
 - B. Calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and must be born on or after October 5, 2025.
 - C. Calf must be registered and tattooed by show date and have original registration certificate.
- 5. Any cow-calf pair may be exhibited provided the following rules are met by the junior exhibitor:
 - A. Cow must be solely owned by the exhibitor at the time of ownership deadline.
 - B. Calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and must be born on or after October 5, 2025.
 - C. Calf must be registered and tattooed by show date and have original registration certificate.
- 6. Steers entered in the carcass contest must be halter broke to lead and will stall with the other cattle in the barn.

Premiums & Awards:

- 1. Any questions regarding premiums or awards should be forwarded to the Association office no later than six weeks after date of show.
- 2. Banners and trophies will be awarded to champions in each division and category.
- 3. A scholarship is provided to the exhibitor of the Grand Champion Bred-and-Owned Heifer by Bob & Marillyn Schlutz. A scholarship is provided to the exhibitor of the Grand Champion Bred-and-Owned Cow Calf Pair by the family of Joel Harrison.

Carcass Contest:

1st-\$1000; 2nd-\$750; 3rd-\$500; 4th-\$400; 5th-\$350; 6th-\$300; 7th-\$250; 8th-\$200; 9th-\$150; 10th \$100; all others qualifying-\$50. Dr. Curtis and Ann Long will provide all of the premium, AHIR, and CAB cash awards to the respective winners through a permanent endowment with the Angus Foundation.



Carcass Contest continued:

To qualify for placing carcasses must have a quality grade of Choice or Prime. Carcasses meeting CAB® standards will receive an additional 25% in premiums. To do this the carcass must meet minimum show requirements and have a quality grade of average choice or higher. For a copy of the formula used to calculate placing in the carcass contest, please contact the Events and Education Department at the American Angus Association. The carcass steers will be sold using a grid-pricing schedule.

The carcass steers will be evaluated for CAB qualifications per the USDA G1 schedule specifications for the Certified Angus Beef brand.

Carcass Specifications

- 1. "Modest" or higher marbling score (average Choice or higher)
- 2. Ribeye Area (REA) of 10.0 17.0 in.2
- 3. Hot Carcass Weight (HCW) less than 1,100 lbs
- 4. Fat Thickness (FT) less than 1.0 inch
- 5. "A" maturity (youngest classification for beef)
- 6. Medium to fine marbling texture

Other Awards

Best Five Head (Owned):

Five individual animals, (owned heifers or owned steers, no cow-calf pairs allowed), entered by three or more exhibitors from a junior Angus association are eligible. Limit: one group per association. Only junior association members may enter the showring. Limit: five holders plus one or two "stickmen". No entry fee. Banners will be awarded for each animal in the top group.

Best Five Head (Bred & Owned):

Five individual animals, (bred-and-owned heifers, bred-and-owned bulls and/or bred-and-owned steers, no cow-calf pairs allowed), entered by three or more exhibitors from a junior Angus association are eligible. Limit: one group per association. Only junior association members may enter the showring. Limit: five holders plus one or two "stickmen". No entry fee. Banners will be awarded for each animal in the top group.

<u>Premier Breeder</u> includes the three highest placing animals bred by a single breeder. Champions will be used only in the case of a tie. The winner, to be determined at the conclusion of the show, receives a pewter tray.

<u>Premier Junior Breeder</u> includes the three highest placing animals bred by a junior breeder. Champions will be used only in the case of a tie. The winner, to be determined at the conclusion of the show, receives a pewter tray.

State Carcass Group Contest

All rules for eligibility to participate in the NJAA Carcass Steer Show apply to the State Carcass Group Contest. A minimum of two and a maximum of three junior exhibitors from the same state can designate three steers to enter as a group. The groups can be entered at any time following the official carcass steer weigh-in, but must be designated prior to the cattle being shipped to the packing plant for harvest and data collection. Entries can be submitted by completing a State Carcass Group Contest entry form that lists the ear tag (entry) numbers of the three steers comprising the group. The entry form for this contest will be available at the check-in table for carcass steers at the NJAS. No entry fee, independent of that to participate in the individual carcass steer contest, will be assessed to those exhibitors designating cattle for the State Carcass Group Contest. No limit will be placed on the number of groups a state may enter. The Carcass Groups will be ranked using an adjusted group carcass index. Individual carcass index values will be averaged to determine a group index. The range between the low and the high individual indexes within the group will then be subtracted from the group index to determine the adjusted group index. The Carcass Group with the highest adjusted group index will be determined the winner. Points will be appropriately awarded to each state to count toward determining the sweepstakes winner. Awards will be announced for the Champion and Reserve Champion State Carcass Group

Miscellaneous:

- 1. The National Junior Angus Show is a family event. Any false representation, interference or unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any attendee will be dealt with by the American Angus Association staff according to the equities of the case. If any attendee interferes in any way with the judges or shows disrespect to them, the staff or the show, the Association may withhold any awards or take any other steps deemed desirable.
 - 2. Stall Assignments: All cattle at the National Junior Angus Show will be stalled by state in the barns and in tie-outs. It is the responsibility of the state junior Angus association to coordinate the stalls for their state within the area assigned to them.
 - 3. No farm signs.
 - 4. Tie-outs: A row in tie-outs will be designated for Cow/calf pens only. Please list on your entry form if you will be using a cow/calf pen.
 - 5. Bedding: A mulch bedding is being provided in barn and tie-outs by American Angus Association.
 - 6. Generators are allowed in designated areas only. NO generators in tie outs.
 - 7. Porta coolers are NOT allowed on grounds!

The Jim Baldridge Outstanding Leadership Award was designed to recognize one outstanding NJAA member. This prestigious award is based upon the leadership that has been exhibited by the nominee through their Angus involvement and other activities as presented in the application. The recipient will receive an award by the NJAA and a scholarship from the Angus Foundation. The application is due May 1.

National Junior Recognition Program

The American Angus Association established a National Junior Recognition Program in 1972. It has been successful in providing an opportunity for young Angus breeders to become nationally recognized for continued achievement. This program is based on activities over a junior member's entire career. There are three levels of recognition; Bronze, Silver, and Gold. Bronze and Silver Awards can be earned at any age. The Gold Award, however, will be given only during the last year of eligibility as a junior member. Winners of the various levels receive a specially designed pin, cast in the metal of the respective award (Bronze, Silver, or Gold).

Crystal Award

The Crystal Award is sponsored by the American Angus Auxiliary and awarded to the highest placing male and female junior Angus member in all the contests held at the NJAS.

Silver Pitcher

The American Angus Auxiliary awards the top placing male and female exhibitors at the NJAS with a Silver Pitcher. Points are awarded in each of the following categories: steer, cow-calf, owned heifer, bred-and-owned bull, and bred-and-owned heifer.

American Angus Auxiliary Scholarships

The American Angus Auxiliary awards scholarships annually to five young men and five young women who have demonstrated exceptional participation and achievements in Angus projects, school, community and church, and superior character. Coordination and administration of this scholarship program lies with the Auxiliary. Applications are available from your state Angus Auxiliary, the American Angus Auxiliary Scholarship Chairwomen and www.angusauxiliary. com. The winners are announced at the NJAS.

Colvin Scholarship

Developed in 1999 as Louis M. "Mick" Colvin retired from the CAB executive director position, this scholarship recognizes his role in making dreams a reality and inspiring others to be their best. Colvin directed the beef brand for more than 20 years. This scholarship benefits tomorrow's leaders who are involved in their communities and the beef industry. Scholarships will go to the top applicants based on activities and scholastic achievement, communication skills—essay and verbal and reference letters. State junior Angus associations may nominate an advisor that they feel has been instrumental in the success of their association. Nominations are due March 1.

Angus Foundation Undergraduate Student Degree Scholarship Program

The Angus Foundation will award general scholarships to young men and women actively involved in the Angus breed who are pursuing an undergraduate degree in higher education. Students in all academic degree fields of study are encouraged to apply. Awards consisting of two \$5,000 scholarships in honor of Richard L. Spader, former Executive Vice President of the American Angus Association; a number of general scholarships; and donor-named scholarships will be available. Applicants at one time must have been a NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the American Angus Association, and cannot have reached their 25th birthday prior to January 1 of application year. Awards are announced at the NJAS. Angus Foundation Undergraduate Student Scholarship Program applications are due May 1. Applicants may also be considered for other donor named undergraduate scholarships depending on the applicant meeting the eligibility criteria set forth by the donor and Angus Foundation for those respective scholarships. Past applicants and recipients of Angus Foundation general scholarships can continue to apply for these donor named scholarships. Angus Foundation Graduate Student Degree Scholarship Program

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA)?

The NJAA is the organizational name for junior members of the American Angus Association (Association). It is made up of all of the junior members of the Association. The NJAA is governed by a twelve member board which is elected each year during the annual meeting of the NJAA which is held during the National Junior Angus Show. In order to be a member of the NJAA you must be junior member of the Association and if you are a junior member of the Association you are a member of the NJAA.

What is the cost of a junior membership?

The annual membership fee to be a junior member of the Association is \$20. The payment of this fee allows the junior member to participate in activities and events sponsored by the Association, the NJAA and the Angus Foundation.

NOTE: Additional entry fees, registration fees, and/or supplemental costs may apply depending upon the event or activity.

When does my junior membership expire?

Members must pay annual membership dues in order to stay current and to participate in the programs offered. The membership renewal date is based on the day they joined the association.

In the calendar year of the juniors 21st birthday, the junior may participate in junior programs offered by the Association, NJAA and the Angus Foundation through the entire calendar year, even though "officially" their membership expired on their 21st birthday.

At what age am I eligible to show in Junior Angus Shows?

The age requirements for shows vary both on the younger age limit as well as the older age limit. It is important to check the rules for age of the exhibitor for the specific show in which you are interested in participating.

NOTE: For shows sponsored and coordinated by the American Association the junior must be a minimum of 7 years of age before January 1 of the calendar year of the show. The junior members' last year of eligibility is the calendar year of their 21st birthday.

What is a bred and owned?

A bred-and-owned animal is one where the junior member owned the dam of the heifer/bull at the time the heifer/bull was conceived. The junior member must be listed as the breeder, first and continuous owner on the registration certificate.

Frequently Asked Questions

How does multi-ownership with siblings work?

Multi-ownership of animals between siblings, provided all siblings meet NJAA age requirements and are listed as owners by the ownership deadline.

Owned animals can be multi-owned between siblings as long as all siblings own the animal by the ownership date and are within NJAA show NJAA show rule ages (as of January 1). For Bred and Owned animals, the exhibitor must still be the breeder, first owner, and continuous owner. Animals can have a maximum of 3 owners.

When do we need to decide who is showing the animal at the time of entering or at check in? Exhibitors won't need to "declare" which sibling is showing the animal until they go into the ring.

Can I show heifer in class and my sibling show it in the division?

Yes – we just ask that the exhibitor has the correct back tag in.

Can I enter the same animal in the Owned Heifer Show and the PGS show? Can a different sibling show it in each?

The same animal can be entered in the Owned Heifer show and the PGS Heifer show, and a different sibling may show it in either show as long as they are on the registration paper as of the ownership deadline and are within the NJAA show eligibility age range

Can an animal be entered in both the Bred and Owned Show and Owned Show at the same event?

An animal can only be entered in one or the other. Bred and Owned rules still apply. The animal could be entered in the PGS show.

What is BEEF Academy?

This one-of-a-kind, online learning platform houses content designed by industry experts to help NJAA learn more about the beef industry. Tailored modules meet the learning needs of junior members of all ages.

What age am I able to attend conferences?

Junior members can attend conferences once they have turned 14 year olds. Members can attend until their junior membership expires.
